RE: SB 325 Proponent Testimony – Written Only Testimony

Chairwoman Erickson and Members of the Committee,

I write to you today to urge your strong support in passing SB 325. SB 325, or as it has been referred to as the Transformation of Passenger and Freight Industry Act, would attract numerous new businesses to the State, with serious capital investment. Additionally, it would create new good paying jobs across the State.

With the announcement of the Panasonic development, Kansas has been placed on the map for economic development. The ripple effects we have seen from Panasonic has been tremendous in terms of job creation and people moving to Kansas. SB 325 takes the Panasonic development and finds a way to expand on that.

Numerous businesses will be in the market to try and be located close to the Panasonic plant. As such, they will likely go wherever the incentives take them, especially since Missouri is so close to the Plant. SB 325 allows Kansas to stay ahead of the curve and to likely win additional developments.

Even in instances not related to Panasonic, we know now that developments within the EV and hydrogen powered vehicles sector comes with very large capital investments. As such, SB 325 not only will attract business wanting to be close to Panasonic but will also attract new businesses for other areas of the State.

Finally, the clawback provisions of SB 325 allows the State to move forward with this incentive package with little risk. If a Company doesn't hold up their end of the bargain under SB 325, then they would have to repay the State for any of the incentives received. Due to this, Legislators should have little fear of risk in passing SB 325.
